Classroom-Teachers can teach physics . . . Parent-Teachers can teach good manners. Both are essential to the future success of the child . . . neither can do the job alone.

As a community, we must unify, identify, celebrate, award and reward our inspiring Classroom-Teachers. They are the key to our children's academic success and a shining example of what's possible for other teachers who are aspiring to achieve the same level of success.

Compulsory school attendance laws and the great expenditures for education both demonstrate our recognition of the importance of education to our democratic society. **It is required** in the performance of our most basic public responsibilities, even service in the armed forces.

It is the very foundation of good citizenship.

Today it is a principal instrument in awakening the child to cultural values, in preparing him for later professional training, and in helping him to adjust normally to his environment. In these days, it is doubtful that any child may reasonably be expected to succeed in life if he is denied the opportunity of an education.

Such an opportunity, where the state has undertaken to provide it, is a right which must be made available to all on equal terms."
